Main Topic - Payroll Report Change

On the first of every month, we run a payroll report based on the grades that were entered in the prior month for each course. We use that report to process payroll. This system took the place of "tally sheets" which were in use for payroll prior to this switch.

With this change in the payroll reporting system, we began emailing instructors a list of graded assignments each month. Initially, we used this method to ensure that our computer-based reporting system was as accurate as the paper-based reporting system it replaced.

Over the past six months, we have collected feedback provided by instructors, and used this feedback to design a new email payroll report. Beginning in the month of November, the email payroll report will be simplified. Your payroll report will include the following information: total payment amount, number of assignments included in the LRMS report, and "additions." Additions can be understood as: the number if assignments reported on the assignment resubmission form, compensation for revision work, compensation for covering grading in a course you do not normally facilitate, etc.

Instructors should still keep a record of assignments graded each month and compare their record total with the total included in the payroll report. Should you find any inconsistencies, please alert the IL office to the issue immediately by emailing il@dcs.wisc. edu It is our hope that the new, streamlined format of the IL payroll report will better fit instructor needs. If you wish to continue to receive the long version of the payroll report, please let us know.

New Title

Independent Learning, a program that is built on a long and rich history of distance education, has undergone changes over the years. One notable change is the use of the internet for online course delivery.

With this change, the instructional titles of professor, grader, and instructor have become less descriptive of the work that DCS IL instructional specialists do in the Independent Learning Program. Much of the work is now related to welcoming students and helping students stay on track as they progress through the courses.

In order to provide a better description of the work that you do, IL will be introducing the title "Course Facilitator." Courses will begin using this title in the next revision cycle. Of course, you are welcome to begin using this title now in your correspondence with students if you find that it better fits your needs and expectations.


Fun Fact: Fast Completion

IL recommends that students take a minimum of 3 months to complete a course, which allows students to complete a course while following a semester schedule. With instructor consent, students may complete their course at a more rapid pace.

Good Practice Reminder: Exam Grades

Many IL courses offer students the opportunity to complete their exams in D2L with remote proctoring. If your course allows for this option, this reminder is for you!

If your course offers exams in D2L, please email the exam grades and final course grades to the DCS IL offices (il@dcs.wisc.edu). Please do not enter these grades in LRMS. LRMS is the official student record for the course, and the exam grade cannot be considered official until a clear proctor report has been received.

We review these reports in the DCS IL offices, and as a part of our report, we log in to LRMS, make notes about any flagged exams, and enter the exam grades.
